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HIGH QUALITY TEACHING AND LEARNING

Early Learning Goal

The early learning goal of GSSD states:

By June 30th 25% more students will exit Kindergarten at appropriate development (green) than when entering Kindergarten.

To achieve this goal:

- Kindergarten classrooms held family engagement events both in class and virtually. The engagement events helped foster positive connections between the home and school.
- The family engagement events focused on events such as family heritage, favorite memories, and looking back to the past.



School: Churchbridge Public School Activity: Family Engagement Days

The Kindergarten class from Churchbridge Public School held family engagement days so the students could learn about each other's heritage.



School: Grayson School Activity: Virtual Family Engagement

The Kindergarten class at Grayson School held a virtual family engagement event. They read a story about making memories and then the students and their families created a scrapbook page about a family memory. At the end of the event the students shared their memory pages.







School: Norquay School Activity: Virtual Family Engagement Days

Norquay School's Kindergarten class held two virtual family engagement events. The first family engagement day focused on building positive relationships, supporting, and understanding early childhood development and the value of family diversity. The second family engagement included making a traditional food with a family member or having a grandparent or an elder tell them a story of their past.

Reading Goal

The reading goal of GSSD states:

By June 30th there will be 10% more Grade 1 to 3 students reading at or above grade level as compared to data from the previous year.

To achieve this goal schools:

- implemented take home and after school reading programs,
- held family literacy days,
- installed bookworm vending machines, and
- used One School One Book strategy.

These different activities promoted literacy and the development of reading skills as students read at school and with their family.



School: Dr. Brass School Activity: After School Reading Program

The After School Reading Program provides an opportunity for individualized reading instruction for students. Students develop both their word attack and comprehension skills. It is an opportunity for students to improve their reading skills and is perfect for students who need extra support or are reading beyond their grade level.

School: Canora Junior Elementary School Activity: Family Literacy Day

Canora Junior Elementary School launched their One School One Book program on Family Literacy Day. The name of the book was "Humphrey – School Days" by Betty G. Birney. All families were given a calendar of which chapters to read and many activities around the chapters/book took place at school.






School: PJ Gillen School Activity: Bookworm Vending Machine

PJ Gillen installed a bookworm vending machine to ensure their students had easy access to new books. Students are allowed pick their own books when they are awarded "book coins."

School: Columbia School Activity: One School One Book

Columbia School has implemented One School One Book for 9 years in a row. This year the book was Roald Dahl's *Matilda*. The book was read aloud by an adult or older sibling at home. This was time well spent together as a family and gave families good literature at the same time. The One School, One Book team celebrated the end of reading the book with students and staff and had many fun activities within their class cohorts.



School: Davison School Activity: One School One Book

Davison School read the book *The Wild Robot* by Peter Brown for their One School One Book activity. The project involved PreK to Grade 6 students. A package of materials was sent home with the eldest student in each family. The book reading culminated with families building a robot at home and bringing it to school to be displayed around the school.





School: Yorkdale Central School Activity: Reading Buddies

Yorkdale Central School Reading Buddy program matched younger students with seniors and promoted reading together.



Writing Goal

The writing goal of GSSD states:

By June 30th there will be 2% more Grade 4, 7, & 9 students writing at or above grade level compared to the data from the previous year.

To achieve this goal students took part in the following:

- word study activities,
- writing for the Young Saskatchewan Writer's Contest,
- using bump it up walls,
- participating in writing conferences,
- completing quick writes,
- observing explicit mini lessons, and
- writing for newsletters and newspapers.

By participating in the writing activities, students were able to write for a variety of audiences and for different purposes.





School: Grayson School Activity: Word Study Groups

Grayson School used small word study groups in Grades 1 to 4. Students participated in a variety of hands-on learning opportunities to study their words.

School: Dr. Brass School Activity: Young Saskatchewan Writer's Contest

This was the first year that our students entered the Young Saskatchewan Writers' Contest. We were pleased when it was announced that our school had five students whose writing was chosen in the contest.



School: Davison School Activity: Bump It Up Walls

Every teacher had a bump up wall in their classroom. On the wall were work samples that showed students what a 1, 2, 3 and 4 looked like. Teachers used the work samples in the display to show students how they could bump up their work to the next level. The work samples on the bump it up walls changed as each outcome was worked on.







School: Macdonald School Activity: Class Quick Writes


The Macdonald School Grade 5/6 class completed quick writers as a class.

Math Goal

The math goal of GSSD states:

By June 30th there will be 2% more Grade 2, 5, & 8 students at or above grade level in math compared to data from the previous year.

To achieve this goal students:


- participated in math centers,
- · took part in math family engagements, and
- used math word and instructional walls.

The math activities students took part in at their schools helped to achieve the strategic math goal of the school division.



School: Grayson School Activity: Station Based Math

All K to 6 classrooms used the MATH acronym for their math stations. This acronym promoted consistency throughout the school. The use of station-based math allowed teachers to work with small groups and provided each student with targeted and intentional instruction.

Reduced Anxiety Goal

The reduced anxiety goal of GSSD states:

By June 30th the number of students in Grades 4 to 12 reporting high levels of anxiety will reduce by 2% as compared to data from the previous year.

To achieve this goal schools implemented many different activities including:

- Positive Behavioral Intervention and Support with PAWS
- You Are Amazing Postcards
- Yoga Teen Yoga and Mindfulness May Yoga
- Day of Kindness
- Zones of Regulation
- The Green Frisbee Method
- Rainbow Club
- Club Connect
- Girl Power
- Girl Empowerment
- Mindful Moments

The various activities were all aimed at reducing the anxiety of students and helping them develop strategies they could use when they became anxious or needed to reduce the stress in their daily lives.



School: P.J. Gillen School Activity: Positive Behavioral Intervention and Support (PBIS) and PAWS

PJ Gillen utilizes PBIS where students are explicitly taught behavior expectations for various parts of our school. A behavior matrix has been developed and common language with common expectations are taught to students. Students are recognized for PAWSitive behavior with PBIS rewards. Students can redeem their points to purchase various items such as an RCMP Ride Along, Principal's Chair for the Day, or jar of slime.

School: Esterhazy High School Activities: Zones of Regulation

The Grade 6 and 7 classes at Esterhazy High School use the zones of regulation to teach students the self-regulation skills necessary for good mental health, relationships, perseverance, and success beyond school. Students are explicitly taught how to use the zones. Students can choose a zone card when they feel the need to communicate their zone to their teacher or need support in getting back in the green.



School: Dr. Brass School Activity: Green Frisbee Method

The Green Frisbee is used to allow students time and space to regulate their emotions. If they are unable to regulate, they take the green frisbee and go for a walk, get a drink of water, or other activity of their choice. When staff see a student with a green frisbee, they do not bother the students. Staff allow the student time and space to regulate. Once a student is regulated, they return to class





'In my opinion, Rainbow Club this year was phenomenal. I enjoyed every minute of it. I am sad that so many members are graduating and leaving this year. 'Having Rainbow Club in this school reminds everyone in the 2slgbtq+ community that they have a supportive group of people that are just like them. The club helps create friendships that you otherwise wouldn't have. Rainbow Club reminds you that you are not alone.' (Nathan Andrusiak – right)

Rainbow Club serves many purposes in our school and while reducing anxiety and increasing our inclusivity are two large goals, the club does much more for the students and staff involved.

School: Esterhazy High School Activities: Club Connect

Club Connect is a weekly program for Grade 6 to 8 students and runs most of the school year. There are 18 students involved in the program and they have excellent attendance. The Club Connect program targets students with various vulnerabilities who require additional support with social skills, peer connections, and the 40 Developmental Assets.





School: Davison School Activity: Girl Power

In Girl Power we provide a safe place for a group of grade 5 & 6 girls. We discuss different issues such as bullying, body changes, ways to deal with stress (mindfulness), cooperation, dealing with peer pressure, rumors and gossip, personal hygiene and just a time for the girls to express themselves and have fun. We meet once a month.



School: Yorkdale Central School Activity: Girl Empowerment

Girl Empowerment offers yoga, mindfulness, meditation, and breath techniques to provide students their own tools to manage anxiety and feel good.





Mindful moments help students transitioning to a zone of being ready to learn after lunch recess. Reset moments include 5-minute classroom yoga, guided meditation, podcasts, short read aloud stories,

cooperative activities, and even funny videos to brighten students' moods. The students look forward to the "reset moments" and often suggest ideas for reset activities.









Student Intellectual Engagement Goal

The student intellectual engagement goal of GSSD states:

By June 30th students in Grades 4 to 12 will report a 2% increase in student intellectual engagement compared to data from the previous year.

To achieve this goal schools implemented many different activities including:

- Take Me Outside Days
- Winter Carnival and Play Day
- Outdoor Learning Environments
- Greenspace Learning
- Mindfulness Room
- Talking Circles
- Science Fair

The activities that support this goal extend learning beyond the classroom walls.

Grayson School took their learning outside on two different occasions. They took part in activities that were nature based, involved team building and focused on physical activities.










School: Canora Junior Elementary School **Activities:** Winter Carnival and Play Day

Students can use the room to help them regulate and then they can return to class when they are ready to learn.



School: Davison School Activities: Talking Circles

Talking circles are used regularly throughout the school year at Davison School. A traditional talking stick is passed around the circle. Talking circles promote a sense of community by giving every student an opportunity to share what they are doing both in school as well as at home.



School: Grayson School Activity: Science Fair

A Science Fair with over 100 students from Macdonald School and Grayson School was held. Students developed their own hypotheses to research both at school and at home.

To achieve this goal schools implemented many different activities including:



School: Grayson School Activity: Indigenous Cultural Experiences

Ms. Clorice Delorme visited our school 4 times throughout the school year. During her visits, she shared with us her knowledge of the 4 sacred medicines, led us through a porcupine quill harvest, taught us to do quill work, and together with Elder Andrew Quewezance led us through a deer hide tanning learning experience.







School: Canora Junior Elementary School Activity: National Indigenous Peoples Day

Canora Junior Elementary School partnered with Canora Composite School and brought in an Indigenous dancing group from Kawacatoose First Nation to help honor National Indigenous People's Day. Stella Pelly also came in to share her knowledge with the students.

The Canora Junior Elementary School Grade 1 and 2 classes visited the Powwow in Yorkton on June 21st National Indigenous People's Day.

Cree Delorme completed a Special Project Credit to honour the Missing Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls in Canada. To achieve this goal schools implemented many different activities including:



School: Esterhazy High School Activity: First Aid and Mental Health First Aid

The Grade 10 students at Esterhazy High School take First Aid through St. John's Ambulance as part of their Wellness 10 class. In addition, the Grade 11 students completed the Canadian Mental Health Association's First Aid training. This 2-day professional training provides an understanding of various mental health conditions and helps participants become more aware of their own mental health. The Mental Health First Aid training helps participants learn how to support someone experiencing a mental health crisis, and how/when to refer them for help.

On Monday mornings, the Grade 12 Esterhazy High School presidents and a different staff member lead our Warrior Whistle announcements. We start with a Treaty 4 Land Acknowledgement, followed by various celebrations of activities and accomplishments of our students.
